1. What is the name of the airplane hanging from the ceiling?
2. Look at the side of the airplane. What records did Wiley Post set using this airplane?
3. The symbols in the floor relate to what famous Oklahoma object?
4. What domed building do you see outside the window?

In the ONEOK Gallery next to the elevators

5. Did all Indians live in teepees? What do you see in the exhibits that supports your answer?
6. Notice the star chart overhead and read the panel on the Pawnee Indians who made the original. Why would they have made a star chart?
7. What did Lewis and Clark give to the Otoe Indians?
8. On the left side of the gallery, find the exhibit on language. How have the Indian peoples tried to preserve their languages and stories?
9. Go to the back left side of the gallery that is in the shape of a loop. Find the panel that answers this question: Both life and death are part of _____.
10. In the back right side of the gallery, find the necklace made of teeth. What kind of teeth are they?

In the INASMUCH Gallery next to the admissions desk

When you enter the gallery, go to the right. Questions 11 through 13 are on the Latino exhibit, *Tierra di mi Familia Oklahoma*

11. Look at the first big case you come to. What is the Jarabe Tapatio dance outfit used for?
12. On the left, there is a case mounted on the wall. Why was Rufino Rodrigues considered a hero?
13. Look on the wall above the computer screen. What were the earliest piñatas made of?

Go past the Latino exhibit, staying to the right. Enter the comic exhibit about comics made by people who are from Oklahoma.

14. Look at the large banner above the Dick Tracy exhibit case. The banner is for a Dick Tracy movie. What is the name of the movie?
15. Find the caped figure holding a silver gun in the exhibit case. What is the character's name?
16. Continue to the right to the case about Archie Goodwin who is from Tulsa. What are four different comics that Archie Goodwin wrote?

Continue to the back of the gallery and go to the left to enter the sports exhibit.

17. Find the panel on Andy Payne. What amazing thing did he do?

Go out of the sports exhibit and go past the stage coach. Enter the Star Maker exhibit.

18. See the Hank and Wanda panel. Who was the first country artist to record a "live and in person" album? What was it called?
19. Go into the room with the records on the wall. Three of Oklahoman Jim Halsey's artists sold multiplatinum albums. Who were they? How many records do you have to sell to have a platinum album?

Go past the Star Maker exhibit and into the radio exhibit.

20. Who was the first disc jockey to play rock and roll in Oklahoma? What station was it on? In what city?

21. What is the name of the spacecraft here?

25. At the back of the gallery, look at the panel about Leon Russell who helped with the Concert for Bangladesh. What was the purpose of the concert?

Look on the right side of the gallery.

26. On the panel, read the quote that tells why Eric Clapton liked Tulsa music. Why did he like Tulsa music?
27. On the left side of the gallery, find Larry Collins' guitar. How is his guitar unusual?

28. In the middle section of the gallery find the panel about Red Dirt music. This music is influenced by _____ and _____.

Upstairs on the Third Floor

Go up the stairs until there aren't any more stairs.

In the Noble Gallery on the right as you reach the third floor.

29. Notice the wagon on the right. Read the panel in front of it. In how many land runs was this wagon used?
30. As you go past the wagon, you come to the sod house. Read the panel to the left of the door. List three problems with living in a sod house.
31. As you go past the farm and ranch area, and past the tractor, you come to a white house. Look on top of the stove in the kitchen. What are the things sitting on top of the oven? What is the big gray machine?
32. When you go past the windmill, you come to the tornado area. Read about tornadoes. How strong is a category five tornado?

To the right is the rock and roll venue exhibit.

33. On one of the panels is this statement where you need to fill in the blank:
"When the audience goes nuts, _____."

Turn back toward the front of the gallery where you will come into the Rock Fashions exhibit.

34. In the 1980s, how did MTV affect pop culture and teen fashions?

Continue toward the front of the gallery into the rockabilly exhibit.

35. What is rockabilly?

36. When you come to the kitchen, notice what the main color is. Why is it this color? Why do you think this color was used so much in kitchens in the 1950s?
37. In the schoolroom area, how are the desks different from the one that you use? What is an unusual thing that you find inside a desk? (Not all of the desks have something inside, so you may need to look in more than one.)

38. Find the iron lung. What was an iron lung used for?
39. Keep going; you'll come to the state government area. Find the Territorial seal. What does it look like?
40. Keep going past the government area; you'll come to the law and order area. Find Carrie Nation's pin. Describe it.

In the Kerr-McGee Gallery

41. As you enter the gallery, turn right into the African American exhibit. What Oklahoman was awarded the Congressional Medal of Honor, the Silver Star, and the Purple Heart?
42. Further along and to the right is a replica of a church. Find the Breeze Booster flexible edge in an exhibit case. Explain what the Breeze Booster is and why it would be needed in church.
43. Next to the barber shop notice the water fountains. Why are there two water fountains? Explain the idea behind them.
44. Go past the water fountains to the right and see the Funk and Soul exhibit. What do you think Funk and Soul Music is?

45. At the back of the gallery is the area that deals with wars in the 20th century including World War I. Find the M1917-A1 helmet. What is painted on it?
46. Also in this area is information on the POW camps in Oklahoma. Explain how these prisoner of war camps were good for Oklahoma.
47. Continue on out of the war exhibit and turn right where the red car is. What was the price of a 1951 "Bullet Nose" Studebaker? Is that a high price?
48. Continue past the Studebaker to the right. Find the roller skates and tell why Sonic had them. Do you still see carhops using skates today? Why or why not?
49. The transportation area is in the middle section of the gallery. Find the barrel. What had been inside the barrel? How long had it been inside there?
50. The natural resources area is on the right side of the gallery near the front. In the oil and gas exhibit, find the Wild Mary Sudik. What is the Wild Mary Sudik? Why was it called "wild"?
